
Team” embroidered on them.

Lady Crusaders Varsity Basketball

The 2015-2016 season for the Lady Crusaders is well underway, with senior captains Emilie Benton, Abby Fountain, and MJ Clement leading the team. The team this year has joined girls of many different grade levels, ranging from eighth grade to twelfth grade, after losing five players from last year's squad. Returning players also include, Seniors Gabi O'Neil and Faith Gilbert, Junior Taylor Engster and Sophomore Hannah Field. New to the team are Senior Abby Fitzgerald, Juniors Shayla McCarroll and Kelly Stanton, Sophomore Emma Field, Freshman Riqyia Harris, and 8th grader Grace Field.

Currently, the team's league record is 4-1, with a tough loss to the Academy of the Holy Names in a competitive game. For the non league games, the Crusaders played Proctor and St. Laurent in the Albany High Showcase, where they emerged 1-1 for the weekend. Entering the Colonial Council for the first time this year has been an adjustment, and head coach Audra DiBacco is ready to compete.



When asked of her expectations for the team this season, Coach DiBacco says "being in the Colonial Council is new, but our team goal is always the same. To go out and compete every day and win the conference." With new teams on the schedule this year, it is crucial that the team focuses on their internal strengths and analyzes the competition strategically. The biggest competition for the team this year in the conference will be Holy Names, but Coach DiBacco is confident in defeating them in a rematch scheduled in February by understanding their strengths and weaknesses and watching film to plan how to defeat them and learn from past mistakes. The team is also scheduled to play in the Colonie High School Christmas Tournament, where the Crusaders will face various Suburban Council teams that will challenge them.

The team's strong points include their strong guards, and valuable inside presence. The girls compete with each other each day and hold a great team camaraderie, which shows on the court as the girls are able to work together and collectively get everyone involved in the game, from those on the court to those on the bench. So far, the leading scorer is Abby Fountain, who has 104 points on the season, with Emilie Benton following as second leading scorer. The Crusaders are looking ahead to the rest of their season and are eager to dominate more games. The team's record is now 7 wins and 2 losses. The team next plays on December 21st at Voorheesville at 6:30 pm and on Sunday December 27 at Colonie at 6 pm. Come out and support the team at the Colonie Christmas Tournament and as they progress through their season!

Boys' Varsity Basketball

With the graduation of two starters, Raquis Harris and Brian Brooks, and the transfer of standout Anthony Mack, it is time for other players to step up as CCHS Boys' Varsity Basketball team pursues and independent schedule, competing as a Class AA team. While CCHS has joined the Colonial Council, the Boys' Basketball team will pursue an independent schedule. Opponents will include familiar team such as LaSalle and

Schenectady and new foes such as Icabod Crane, Lansingburgh, Fonda, Watervliet, Schalmont, Ravena, Cobelskill, Albany Academy and Newburgh Free Academy.

Seniors Gabe Woodley, Alex Decker, Terrance Jones, and Christian Englund, have already begun to lead while Seniors Matt Scarlett, Brian Courcelle, Corey Grant, Michael Hill, Dylan Wells, and Juniors David Quell, Damien Walker, and Michael Korkemas seek to contribute as reserves.

The team started slowly and, as of December 18, the team's record was 2 wins and 5 losses. Catholic Central will be undersized against almost all of its opponents this season but hopes to make this up by practicing and playing hard. Coach Chuck Mack expressed confidence and pride in his players and said, "As a team, all the young men are practicing very hard and all are trying to improve. It has been my experience in coaching at all levels for over thirty years, that teams improve as all the players improve, not just the players who play the most minutes in the games...As a team we have won two of the last four outings, and have gotten immeasurably better in each. I expect that this 2015-16 season will become a successful one."



Senior guard Gabe Woodley leads the team in scoring (12.7 points per game) followed closely behind by Junior Alex Decker (12.1 points per game). Gabe also leads in assists and steals, while placing second to Christian Englund in rebounds per game, 5.6 to Christian's 8.1 rpg.

Gabe Woodley is also first in 2 point field goal percentage at 57% and first in 3 point field goal percentage at 38%, as well as first in free throw percentage at 78%. The team's defensive stopper and floor leader, along with Gabe, is Terrance Jones, who places in the top 3 of all statistical categories. Jones is also the team's top defender and always guards the opponent's best player

In the team's last two games, Coach Mack said that Christian Englund has played "phenomenally" in achieving a double/double in each game, 11 points and 13 rebounds against a very tall and athletic Schenectady High team, followed up by 14 points and 13 rebounds against Fonda-Fultonville.

The team's surprise bright spots on the team are Sophomore starting guard, Brandon Grimes, and Sophomore forward Luke Clement. Both are performing at a high level, and Coach Mack expects they will only get better. As the season

progresses, he expects that they will play an integral part in the successful outcome of future contests.

The Crusaders' will be playing in the Colonie Christmas Tournament against Colonie on Tuesday December 29 at 7 p.m. and against Guilderland at Colonie on Wednesday December 30 at 5:30 p.m. Come and cheer our team on to victory against these two strong opponents.

Indoor Track

The Indoor Track Team is by far the largest team in the school. (Specifically there are: 4 seventh graders, 4 eighth graders, 15 freshmen, 9 sophomores, 14 juniors and 7 seniors.) It provides exercise, camaraderie, and competition for 53 Crusaders during the Winter months. The growth of this team in recent years can be attributed not only to the accessibility of the sport but also, in no small part, to the enthusiasm and dedication of past and present coaches. Running is a life-long sport and young coaches such as Head Coach Wally Foley and Assistant Coach and math teacher Michael Dempsey show the way.

The coaches aim to develop runners, jumpers, and putters starting in the middle grades. The team has set as its goal to be the best team they can be, perhaps the best Indoor Track Team ever at Catholic High. CCHS competes in Division 2 D of the Section II Track League. Meets are held in large field houses such as HVCC, Union College, and UAlbany. On Sunday December 13, the athletes showed their determination to go beyond past CCHS records. Sophomore James Faraci shattered his own school record (set last year) in the 3200 meters by 30 seconds. Sophomore J.P. "Buzz" Loughlin ran the 55 meter spring in 7.27 seconds, besting the record set in 2003 by Dennis Connelly and tied in 2009 by Joe Murtagh. In the triple jump, freshman Greg Daniels set a new school record and personal best of 26'8".

HOT OFF THE PRESSES!!!! This past weekend, at HVCC the Indoor Track Team broke FIVE Indoor Catholic Central school records and more, specifically:

- -The day began with Claudia Fountain (FR) breaking the 55 meter High Hurdles record with a time of 9.2 seconds, breaking Jess Bramski's record of 9.5 from 2006 and placing third for the meet. Claudia also finished 3rd in the High Jump;
- -The Distance Medley Relay team of Spencer Daley (Grade 8), Dylan Behunin (JR), Sebastian Kania (Gr. 8), and James faraci (SO) ran a time of 12:47.1 fracturing the school record set in 2011 by 7 seconds and finishing 4th for the meet;
- -J. P. Lynch (SO) broke the triple jump record set by Greg Daniels last week. Buzz jumped 30'2.5";
- -Dylan Behunin (JR) ran the 600 meters in 1:34.8 breaking Ray Xu's record of 1:39.0 from 2011 and placing FIRST in the event;
- -The Boys' 4x200 Meter Relay team of Kyle Dempsey (SR), Buzz Loughlin (SO), Brandon McFerran (JR) and Ryan Farrar (SR) placed THIRD for the meet;
- -Kyle Dempsey (SR) finished 5th in the Boys' Long Jump;
- -Jenny Picarillo finished 4th in the Shot Put;
- -Finally, the Sprint Medley Relay team of Ryan Farrar (SR), Brandon McFerran (JR), Kyle Dempsey (SR), and Dylan Behunin (JR) ran 4:25.2. This shattered the CCHS team

record set last year by 20 SECONDS!!! It was Dylan Behunin's third race of the day and his third record of the day!!!!!!! The team finished fourth in the finals.

Congratulations Claudia, Spencer, Sebastian, James, Buzz, Brandon, Kyle, Ryan, Dylan, and Jenny and all Crusader runners who have worked so hard every day and ran their best this Saturday! Keep on runnin'!

The holiday season is one of the busiest times of the year for the movie industry. Studios save some of their biggest blockbusters and prime awards season contenders for December, knowing that audiences will flock to theaters. Here are some of the films to look for over the holidays:

Star Wars: The Force Awakens is the highly anticipated seventh installment in one of the most popular and successful film franchises of all-time. Disney and director J.J. Abrams ("Star Trek") have kept the plot under wraps but promise that "Episode VII" won't disappoint. Harrison Ford, Carrie Fisher and Mark Hamill, the stars of the original "Star Wars", return and join several new cast members. *135 minutes. Rated PG-13. Opens December 18th.*

Alvin and the Chipmunks: the Road Trip is the fourth installment in the live-action/animated series. Alvin, Simon and Theodore believe that Dave (reprised by Jason Lee) is going to propose to his new girlfriend, but the Chipmunks don't want to lose Dave forever, the, therefore, come up with a plan to try to stop this from happening. *86 minutes. Rated PG. Opens December 18th.*

Concussion is based on the true story that has shaken the nation over the past 13 years. Will Smith gives an outstanding performance as Dr. Bennett Omalu who was targeted by the NFL for concluding that football players suffer traumatic brain injuries due to the constant head-to-head contact while playing the game. Smith deserves to be nominated for the Best Actor Oscar. *123 minutes. Rated PG-13. Opens December 25th.*

Daddy's Home re-teams Will Ferrell and Mark Wahlberg, who co-stared in 2010's action comedy, "The Other Guys". Here, they play a stepfather and father who compete for their kids'

attention...in the most outrageous ways. *96 minutes. Rated PG-13. Opens December 25th.*

Joy stars Academy Award winner Jennifer Lawrence (“The Hunger Games”). She plays Joy Mangano, the inventor of the Miracle Mop. Bradley Cooper and Robert DeNiro co-star in this dramedy (a comedy with a lot of drama). Lawrence is only 25 years-old, but her performance in the film just earned her the fourth Golden Globe nomination of her career. *124 minutes. Rated PG-13. Opens December 25th.*
